

EL-SHADDAI GOD ALMIGHTY

El-Shaddai translates to mean God Almighty. The name first appears in connection with Abraham. Genesis 17:1-2 (NASB), "Now when Abram was 99 years old, the Lord appeared to Abram and said to him, I am God Almighty (El-Shaddai); walk before Me, and be blameless. And I will establish My covenant between Me and you, and I will multiply you exceedingly."

The name El-Shaddai or God Almighty is much better understood as the El who is all sufficient and bountiful, the source of all blessing and fullness and fruitfulness.

The background for this banner is purple which is associated with royalty and majesty. The white strip signifies holiness and purity; it is also a symbol of glory and majesty. The trims are of silver, gold and purple. The silver is a symbol of royalty and nobility. The gold is symbolic of righteousness. The holes cut through the center are a triangle, which reminds us of the trinity;

God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit. The bells hanging in the triangles signify holiness unto the Lord.

Psalms 20:5 (NASB), "We will sing for joy over victory, and in the name of our God we will set up our banners. May the lord fulfill all your petitions."
